

Maher Nasser, Director, Outreach Division, Department of Public Information, moderated the morning session which featured Damian Cardona, Director Strategic Communications Division, DPI; Daniel Shepard, Public Information Officer, DPI; and Kim Quarles, Representative, NGO/DPI Executive Committee, World Jurist Association. Mr. Nasser talked about the future: for survival we need to "build" the future.

"Discrimination and marginalization characterizes the experience of many refugees and migrants around the world...To address this, I have decided to initiate a global campaign led by the United Nations to counter xenophobia." In Safety and Dignity – Report of the Secretary General

The TOGETHER campaign is a global initiative that aims to change negative perceptions and attitudes towards refugees and migrants, and strengthen the social contact between host countries and communities, and refugees and migrants. All 193 Member States of the United Nations unanimously welcomed the TOGETHER initiative and committed to implementing it when they met at the Summit for Refugees and Migrants on September 19, 2016. TOGETHER will run until the second half of 2018, when member states are expected to adopt two Global Compacts on Refugees and Migrants. TOGETHER is a UN System-wide initiative led by the Secretary General, which will be implemented in partnership with Member States, the private sector and civil society. TOGETHER will speak to communities hosting refugees and migrants, as well as people concerned that refugees and migrants

may bring physical and economic insecurity to their lives. TOGETHER will engage and mobilize global citizens to show support for refuges and migrants. In 1992, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR) collapsed. Soon the former republics sought their independence and accession as a member state of the United Nations. Those celebrating their 25th Anniversary are Kyrgyzstan, Uzbekistan, Kazakstan, Turkministan, and Kazakstan.

Shortly after 1992, Dr. Anthony DeLuca offered his services gratis to the new republic and Kyrgyzstan Ambassador to the United Nations. He was appointed as adviser. Fully understanding this responsibility to the new independent state, Dr. DeLuca pursued studies in diplomacy, international relations and law at Princeton, Georgetown, Eastern Mennonite and James Mason Universities as well as completing a significant number of courses through UNITAR. While at Georgetown, he assisted at the Kyrgyzstan Embassy in Washington, D.C. He serves on Committee Six (Legal) of the General Assembly. In 2004, he was given the title of Honorary Ambassador by the government of the Kyrgyz Republic and in 2015 was invested with the chapin robe for distinguished service.

Feb 21st Monthly CRNGO meeting By Jin Chacko Associate of SOCA and connected with the UN



On February 21st, I attended a monthly thematic business meeting of the CRNGO. The meeting was moderated and led by Rev. Levi Bautista, President of the religious CRNGO. The meeting was discussed on the topic of Religion, Reconciliation and Forgiveness focusing on the struggles of Indigenous Peoples and what repentance requires and what forgiveness demands.

Rev. Bautista had recently traveled to Norway to attend the hundred year anniversary of the Sami people congress meeting. The anniversary is celebrated annually on February 6th in Norway. The Sami people are an indigenous tribe that originated from the Scandinavian countries such as Norway, Finland and Sweden. They are the only ones that can kill reindeer in Norway which they use for food and the fur they use for clothing. Rev. Bautista had mentioned that the Seneca Native tribe has a treaty with a lot of European countries they have there very own passport which they show when they travel to nations such as France and it's accepted by the French government.

A topic was discussed about Manifest Destiny In the 19th century, it was a belief in the United States that settlers were destined to expand across North America but it had serious consequences for Native Americans, since continental expansion implicitly meant the occupation and annexation of Native American land sometimes to expand slavery. This ultimately led to confrontations and wars with several groups of native peoples through the Indian removal act. The United States continued the European practice of recognizing only limited land rights of indigenous peoples. The U.S. government sought to expand into the west through the purchase of Native American land in treaties. Only the Federal Government could purchase Indian lands and this was done through treaties with tribal leaders. Whether a tribe actually had a decision-making structure capable of making a treaty was a controversial issue. A current issue we see today that is going in the world is the Dakota Access Pipeline that many indigenous peoples are protesting against. The US government has allowed drilling in the sacred lands of the indigenous peoples in which they believe in animism a sacredness of their ancestral lands.

The meeting ended with a discussion about the negative side effects of buying imported quinoa. The appetite of countries such as ours for this grain has pushed up prices to such an extent that poorer people in Peru and Bolivia, for whom it was once a nourishing staple food, can no longer afford to eat it. The idea that worldwide demand for quinoa is causing undue harm where it's produced is an oversimplification at best. At worst, discouraging demand for quinoa could end up hurting producers rather than helping them. The UN has declared 2013 the International Year of Quinoa, saying it has the potential to advance food security around the globe and prevent malnutrition.

UN Interfaith Harmony Meeting

Dionne Boissiere Chaplain of the Church Center for the UN. She had mentioned that often times when we do this work it's difficult to work together. A reflections speech was given by the first speaker Mr. Nassir Abdulaziz Al-Nasser, a high representative for the United Nations Alliance of Civilizations had mentioned the alliance is a platform for interrelations dialogue. Followers of different faiths and religious practices are misusing religious beliefs in a negative stern. There is a need to promote interreligious dialogue to raise awareness to humanity together. The European Union, Canada and USA had a forum and spoke about the discrimination against Islam. Religions are for peace and many international organizations are involved to promote it.



Participants of the event were entertained by music played by a Native American flute player and got to see a young girl perform a Chinese Dunhuang style dance. Prayers from the Islamic traditions and the Lord's Prayer from the Anglican book of common prayers were recited by different individuals representing their faith. SOCA NGO Rep Joseph Cannizzo hosted a Jacket Drive at his local martial art school in Staten Island, New York. This Jacket Drive collected winter coat from members, friends and family which were then sent to children and teen agers in Aleppo, Syria. Many kids in Syria are unable to keep warm during the Winter and can fall victim to conditions like hypothermia. After these jackets were collected, they were delivered to a Brooklyn Mosque which has arranged a monthly delivery of charitable items from groups in New York to Aleppo, Syria.

In addition to collecting and sending winter coats to kids in Syria, Joe partnered with Soles4Souls. They provide winter coats for people in need within the continental United States. For every 10 people who

checked into Joseph's school using social media, he provided a coat to someone in need via an online platform named Sweat Angels. Soles4Souls collects and ships gently used winter coats to those that need it the most. There are 50 million Americans living in poverty today and many of them will need a warm coat this winter. Over 85% of all clothing in the United States ends up in landfills instead of being recycled. By sharing gently used clothing with people in need, Soles4Souls not only serves others, but also helps protect the environment.

Once a dog is trained, Guiding Eyes pairs their exceptionally trained dogs to people who are seeking increased freedom and independence, so that together, they can experience all kinds of life adventures.

Inside Look at Major UN Actions & Events

Ambassador Nikki Haley Delivers Remarks to the UN Security Council on Conflicts in Europe Ambassador Nikki Haley, U.S. Permanent Representative to the United Nations, delivered remarks this afternoon at a United Nations Security Council briefing on the maintenance of international peace and security and conflicts in Europe.

"It can be tempting to take Europe's peace and security for granted. Europe is a continent of strong, stable democracies...But Europe faces serious challenges – most acutely, Russia's attempts to destabilize Ukraine and infringe upon Ukraine's sovereignty and territorial integrity."



Ambassador Haley continued, "The United States is committed to the institutions that help keep Europe safe. We will not waver in our support for the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, which is the strongest alliance in history. We are working to make NATO even more effective – deepening cooperation among existing members and keeping the door open to new allies who fulfill the requirements for membership, while seeking to increase burden sharing."

Religious News from Around the World

Forum on Christians in the Middle East

Earlier this month, Archbishop Vicken Aykazian, Diocesan Legate and Ecumenical Director, and the Very Rev. Fr. Aren Jebejian took part in a "Forum on the Persecuted Church," organized by the ecumenical organization Christian Churches Together. The forum was held at the First Presbyterian Church in Newark, NJ.

Participants discussed the persecution of Christians in the Middle East and ways in which churches in the United States might become more involved in assisting and advocating for the cause. They also heard from His Holiness Patriarch Mor Ignatius Aphrem II, Patriarch of Antioch and All the East, on the threats facing Christians in the Middle East and on the work of the Syriac Orthodox Church in the region.

Archbishop Aykazian delivered formal remarks on the persecution of Middle Eastern Christians, offering observations from his recent trip to Iraq. "Christian minorities in the region are often overlooked, marginalized, or encouraged to depart from the Middle East entirely," he said. "Their voices must be enhanced, and magnified, by voices of others throughout the world—Christians, Jews, and Muslims alike—who stand with them in the cause of justice and peace."

History of the Saint Joseph's Table

In the Middle Ages there was a terrible drought in Sicily it hadn't rained for a very long time and all the crops had failed and the people were starving. They prayed to their Patron Saint, St. Joseph and promised that if it would rain they would make a great feast in his honor; and the rains came, the famine was over and the people in all the towns got together to create this great Feast, since it was St. Joseph's Feast Day, March 19, and it fell during Lent, traditionally there is no meat served, all the Feast was made from vegetables and fish and the fruits of the season.

When the Sicilian people emigrated to the United States they brought this Feast with them and wherever Sicilian peoples settled they created the St. Joseph Tables. The most famous ones were in Brooklyn, Hoboken, NJ, Louisville, Ky, Chicago but the biggest and largest of them were in New Orleans.

We, here at the Scoglitti Society, are people from a town in Sicily in the Provence of Ragusa called Scoglitti we have been making this "Tavola di San Giuseppe" as it is called in Italian since the 1940's. We are a non-profit Italian Society that uses the monies from the Table and other charitable events during the year to help our Society members and Italians in general throughout our area, providing scholarships, funds for other notable charities and support some charities in our hometown of Scoglitti in Sicily.

Rage at abandonment by the state as Egypt's Christians dig graves after bombing

TANTA, Egypt (Reuters) – Egyptian Christians wept with rage on Monday as they recovered the bodies of loved ones killed in twin church bombings, furious at a state they believe will no longer protect them from neighbors bent on their murder.

Forty-four people were killed in the attacks on Palm Sunday, a joyous festival a week before Easter when Christians celebrate the triumphant arrival of Jesus in Jerusalem.

At Tanta University hospital morgue, desperate families were trying to get inside to search for loved ones. Security forces held them back to stop overcrowding, enraging the crowd.


"Why are you preventing us from entering now? Where were you when all this happened?" shouted one women looking for a relative. Some appeared in total shock, their faces pale and unmoving. Others wept openly as women wailed in mourning.

A middle-aged man who had just stepped out of the morgue after seeing his dead brother stood with his face buried in his hands weeping. "You sons of bitches," he shouted as his family tried to calm him.

Hours after the attack, Kerols Paheg and other young Coptic Christians were already digging graves in the basement of the devastated St. George Church in the northern Nile Delta city, where the first of the bombs exploded, killing 27 and wounding around 80.

The Islamic State claimed responsibility for the bomb attacks at a church north of Cairo and the cathedral of the Coptic Pope in Alexandria on Palm Sunday, prompting anger and fear among Christians and leading to troop deployments and the declaration of a three-month state of emergency.

He showed photos on his phone of the carnage: human remains, blood and shattered glass strewn across the floor of the church on one of the holiest days in the Christian calendar. "Today was supposed to be a day of festivity," he said.

From now on, Christians will have to protect their churches themselves, rather than rely on the police, "because what's happening is too much. It's unacceptable," he said.

Sectarian bloodshed

Copts make up about 10 percent of Egypt's 92 million people, the largest Christian minority in the Middle East. Yet despite a presence dating back to the Roman era, the community feels increasingly ostracized and has repeatedly been targeted in attacks, including by Islamic State, which claimed responsibility for Sunday's bombings.

Hours after the blast in Tanta, the second bomb blew up at the entrance to Saint Mark's Cathedral in Alexandria, the historic seat of the Coptic pope, killing 17 people including three police officers and wounding 48.

Pope Tawadros had been leading the mass at the time of the blast but escaped unharmed, the Interior Ministry said.

Though Islamic State has long waged a low-level war against soldiers and police in Egypt's Sinai peninsula, its stepped up assault on Christian civilians in the mainland could turn a provincial insurgency into wider sectarian conflict.

On Sunday, the group warned of more attacks and boasted of the number of people killed by three church bombings it says it has carried out since December: 80.

President Abdel Fattah al-Sisi has promised to protect the Christian minority as part of a campaign against extremism. But Copts in Tanta said security was almost non-existent on Sunday despite repeated warnings in recent weeks.

A senior police official told Reuters a bomb was discovered and disabled near the Tanta church about a week ago.

"That should have been an alarm or a warning that this place is targeted," said 38-year-old Amira Maher, who was waiting for her injured brother at a nearby hospital.

"Especially Palm Sunday, a day when many people gather, more than any other time in the year... I don't know how this happened," she said.

Milling about the charred church interior, as if trying to take in the enormity of the attack, several members of the community expressed dismay at what they said was lax security.

Tanta priest Tawfik Kobeish expressed perhaps the most common of all emotions among the grieving: disbelief.

"We were not expecting people who live with us in the same country, people with whom we've shared love and friendships, and with whom we're familiar, to do these things," said Kobeish, the sound of ambulances bearing the wounded echoing outside.
